Stinking Applesauce

The other day Trina opened the refrigerator door and said "Whew, something in here stinks". Ok, so its not like that ever happened in your refrigerator. She began the arduous task of taking things out jar-by-jar and bottle-by-bottle giving each the "whiff test". Eventually came the words: "Whoa, just because it is not past the expiration date, doesn't mean the applesauce won't spoil". That was it; it was the applesauce. It hadn't started growing hair yet, it had not even discolored, but it was the reason for the smell.

Because we recycle, she took the jar out to the field and emptied it and brought it back in to wash for recycling. When I took it back out, the jar smelled fine. You see, it was not the jar that smelled, it was what was in the jar. However, once the sourness became so fouled, it started smelling outside of the jar. Sometimes it is hard to smell what is inside a jar until you take the lid off, yet, sometimes even a tight lid cannot hold the smell in.

The next day, we read an article in "Our Daily Bread" (a daily devotional) published by RBC Ministries of Grand Rapids, Michigan. It was the devotional for Sunday June 3. It was titled: "Careless Speech". – "When my wife and I were visiting a church for a special musical program, we arrived early to get a good seat. Before the program began, we overheard two members seated behind us complaining about their church. They criticized the pastoral staff, leadership, music, ministry priorities, and several other things that made them unhappy. They were either unconcerned about or oblivious to the presence of two visitors in their midst. It occurred to me that their unfortunate conversation could have pushed us away if we were there looking for a new church home. Worse, what if we were seeking God and their disgruntled opinions had driven us away? Their careless speech was not just a matter of words they used or attitudes they displayed, it also demonstrated their lack of concern for the impact those words could have on others. A better approach to the use of words is reflected in Proverbs 17:27, where Solomon said, "He who has knowledge spares his words, and a man of understanding is of a calm spirit." Most often, we would do better not to say all we think or know (or think we know), but instead seek to use the words that promote calm and peace. You never know who may be listening". – Bill Crowder

What do you smell like? It is interesting that that jar of applesauce did not know it stunk. It did not jump out of the refrigerator and say "Its me, its me". It had to be searched out. Just the same, when we overhear someone spewing out bitterness and unkind words, to tell them what they sound like goes un-heeded; they cannot smell themselves. There is only one solution...too bad no one can be "forced" to do it. It is coming broken before God and asking Him: "What do I smell like?" "Show me what I look like on the inside." It is not a pleasant journey, but a necessary one.

We have all heard the expression: "one bad apple spoils the barrel". Many of us have, in years past, had to go sort the potato bin, looking for the spoiled potato before it spoiled those around it. We had to; we depended on them for food. Unfortunately in real life, people sitting next to spoiled potatoes or rotten apples don't pitch the potato out, they sit someplace else or find another potato bin to hang out in. I pray that doesn't happen in our potato bin. James 3:1-12 is an excellent reading. Refresh yourself in God's word. If you need a good cleaning out, why not kneel before the master cleaner.


